5. Describe a scenario where a team would use a running play instead of a passing play. (Max 150 words)

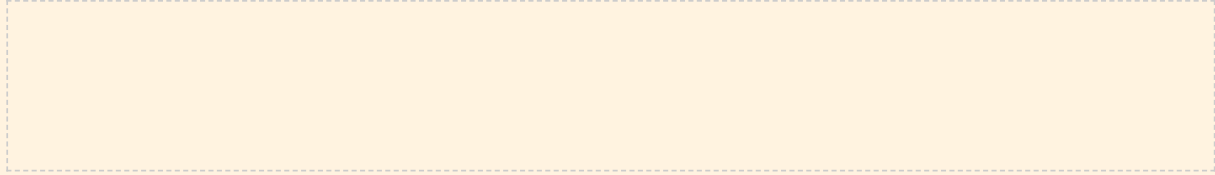
Section 3: Interactive Quiz (10 minutes)

Implementation Guidelines
