

Introduction

Section 2: Short Answer Questions

Answer each question in 1-2 paragraphs.

1. Analyze the use of metaphor in William Wordsworth's poem "The Prelude". How does it contribute to the overall meaning of the poem?

2. Identify and explain the theme of nature in Samuel Taylor Coleridge's poem "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner".

3. Compare and contrast the works of William Wordsworth and Samuel Taylor Coleridge. How do their poems reflect the key features of Romantic poetry?

4. What is the significance of the sublime in Romantic poetry? Provide examples from at least two poems.

5. How does the use of personification in Romantic poetry contribute to the overall effect of the poem? Provide examples from at least two poems.

Section 3: Essay Question

Choose a poem by a Romantic poet and analyze its use of literary devices, themes, and motifs. How do these elements contribute to the overall meaning and impact of the poem? Be sure to provide specific examples from the poem to support your analysis.

Assessment Rubric

The assessment will be graded based on the following criteria:

- Multiple Choice Questions: 1 point for each correct answer
- Short Answer Questions: 5 points for each question
 - Content (3 points): Does the answer demonstrate a clear understanding of the topic?
 - Analysis (1 point): Does the answer provide thoughtful analysis and explanation?
 - Writing quality (1 point): Is the writing clear, concise, and free of errors?
- Essay Question: 50 points
 - Content (20 points): Does the essay demonstrate a clear understanding of the poem and its literary devices, themes, and motifs?
 - Analysis (15 points): Does the essay provide thoughtful analysis and interpretation of the poem?
 - Writing quality (10 points): Is the writing clear, concise, and free of errors?
 - Organization and coherence (5 points): Is the essay well-organized and easy to follow?

Implementation Guidelines

Time allocation: 45 minutes

Administration Tips:

- Ensure students have access to a copy of the poem(s) being analyzed
- Provide clear instructions and examples for each section
- Allow students to ask questions before starting the assessment
- Encourage students to use their time wisely and manage their time effectively

Differentiation Options

To accommodate different learning needs, consider the following options:

For students with learning difficulties:

- Provide extra time to complete the assessment
- Offer a reader or scribe to assist with reading and writing
- Provide a graphic organizer to help with organization and planning

For English language learners:

- Provide a bilingual dictionary or glossary of literary terms
- Offer extra time to complete the assessment
- Provide a graphic organizer to help with organization and planning

For gifted and talented students:

- Provide an additional essay question that requires more complex analysis and interpretation
- Encourage students to create their own poem using Romantic literary devices and themes
- Provide opportunities for students to research and present on a Romantic poet or poem in more depth
