Introduction to Nouns

A noun is a word that refers to a person, place, thing, or idea. Nouns can be categorized into different types, including:

- Proper nouns (names of specific people, places, etc.)
- Common nouns (general terms)
- Concrete nouns (things that can be touched)
- Abstract nouns (ideas or feelings)
- Collective nouns (groups of things)

Examples of nouns include:

- Person: teacher, student
- Place: school, city
- Thing: book, chair

Introduction to Verbs

- Helping verbs (used to form the tense, mood, or voice of another verb)

Examples of verbs include:

Examples of Verbs

Action Verbs:

- run
- jump

Linking Verbs:

- is
- seem

Guided Practice
