Topic: Introduction to Vocabulary Building

Grade Level: 9th Grade

Duration: 90 minutes (can be split into two 45-minute sessions)

Prior Knowledge Required: Basic understanding of vocabulary and language skills

Key Vocabulary: Jobs, career, occupation, employment

Introduction to Jobs (10 minutes)

"Welcome to our lesson on vocabulary building, where we will explore the concept of jobs and its various usages."

[Write the word "jobs" on the board and ask students to share what comes to mind]

For students who need extra support, provide a graphic organizer to help them complete the extension activity

Vocabulary Building Strategies
