Character Motion

- Analyze how characters move and interact with each other, using the three laws of motion to explain their actions and reactions
- Examine how characters' movements and interactions impact the plot and character development

Plot Momentum

- Examine how the plot builds momentum, using the concept of inertia to explain how characters' actions and decisions impact the story
- Analyze how the three laws of motion can be applied to understand the consequences of characters' actions

Conflict Resolution

- Use the three laws of motion to analyze how characters resolve conflicts, applying the principles of action and reaction to understand the consequences of their actions
- Examine how the three laws of motion can be used to predict the outcomes of characters' actions and decisions
