

Romeo and Juliet Assessment Worksheet

Introduction

This worksheet is designed to assess students' understanding of William Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. The activities and questions are tailored to 14-15 year old students and align with the learning objectives of the English Language Arts curriculum.

 How does Shakespeare use language and literary devices to convey the theme of conflict in Romeo and Juliet? Use specific examples from the play to support your argument.
2. Analyze the character of Juliet and her development throughout the play. How does she change and grow, and what factors contribute to her transformation?

Complete the following activities to demonstrate your understanding of Romeo and Juliet.
1. Create a diagram or chart to illustrate the relationships between the characters in Romeo and Juliet.
Write a short scene or dialogue between two characters from the play, exploring their motivations and conflicts.
Imagine you are a director staging a production of Romeo and Juliet. How would you interpret the play's themes and characters? Write a short reflection on your vision for the production.
