Introduction to the Present Continuous Tense

The Present Continuous Tense is used to describe actions that are happening at the moment of speaking. It is formed using the present tense of the auxiliary verb "to be" + the present participle of the main verb (i.e., the -ing form).

- Example: I am studying for my exam.
- Example: She is writing a letter to her friend.

Identifying the Present Continuous Tense
