## What is Migration?

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Migration is the movement of people from one place to another, often in search of better economic, social, or environmental opportunities.

## Types of Migration

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- Internal migration: movement within a country
- International migration: movement between countries
- Forced migration: movement due to conflict, persecution, or natural disasters

## Reasons Behind Migration

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- Economic factors: job opportunities, better living standards
- Social factors: family ties, education, healthcare
- Environmental factors: natural disasters, climate change

### Story 1: Refugee Experience

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A refugee from Syria shares their experience of fleeing war and seeking asylum in a new country.

### Case Study 1: Economic Migration

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A case study of a migrant worker who moved to a new country for better job opportunities.

### Guiding Questions

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- What are the push and pull factors that drive migration?
- How do migrants and refugees experience migration?
- What are the social, economic, and environmental impacts of migration?

### Group Discussion

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Divide students into small groups to discuss the reasons behind migration and its impacts on individuals and communities.

### Role-Playing Activity

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Divide students into small groups to participate in a role-playing activity, where they take on the roles of migrants, refugees, or policymakers.

### Debriefing and Reflection

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Ask students to reflect on their learning and experiences during the group discussion and role-playing activity.



### Conclusion

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Summarize the key points learned during the lesson, using a graphic organizer or concept map.

### Assessment

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Ask students to complete a written assignment or presentation that demonstrates their understanding of the reasons behind migration and its impacts on individuals and communities.

### Feedback and Evaluation

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Provide feedback and evaluation on student learning and understanding, using a rubric and guiding questions.
