



Introduction to Subject and Predicate

The subject of a sentence is the person, place, or thing that the sentence is about. The predicate of a sentence is the action or state of being that the subject is in. For example, in the sentence "The dog runs," "The dog" is the subject and "runs" is the predicate.

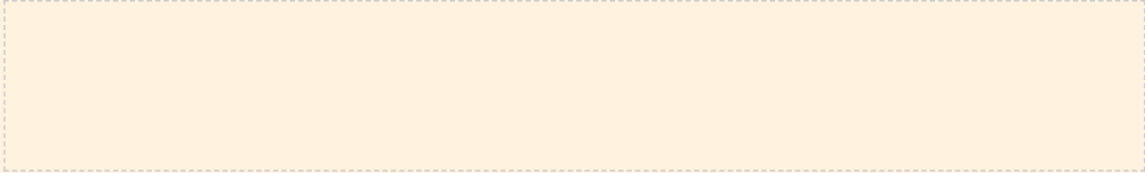
