Multiple Choice Questions:

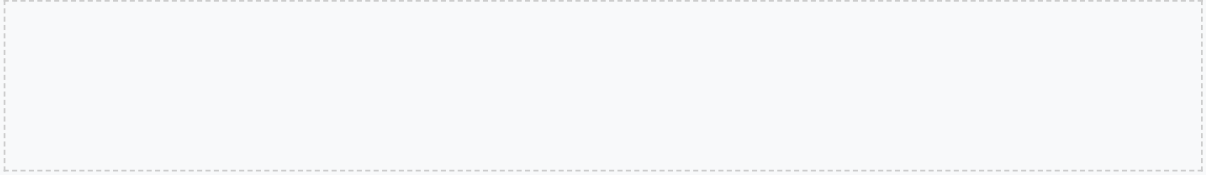
1. What is digital citizenship?
