Introduction to Romeo and Juliet

Background Information

Romeo and Juliet, written by William Shakespeare around 1595-1596, is a tragic love story about two young lovers from feuding families in Verona.

The play explores themes of love, hate, fate, and the destructive nature of impulsive behavior.

Learning Objectives

- Understand the plot and setting of Romeo and Juliet.
- Analyze the main characters (Romeo, Juliet, Tybalt, Lord and Lady Capulet, Lord and Lady Montague).
- Identify and explain character motivations and relationships.
- Develop critical thinking skills through character analysis.



Differentiation Strategies

• Incorporate audio recordings of scenes or discussions about the play.

• Role-play scenes or have students create short skits based on the characters' interactions.

For students with learning difficulties:

• Provide a simplified version of the text or offer one-on-one support during activities.

Assessment Opportunities

Character Maps:

• Have students create a map illustrating the relationships between characters.

Essay Questions:

• Ask students to analyze a character's motivation and how it affects the plot.

Interdisciplinary Connection

Although the primary focus is on English Literature, acknowledging the objective related to the three laws of motion (which are part of Physics) can lead to an interesting interdisciplinary discussion.

For example, how might the concept of action and reaction (Newton's third law of motion) be metaphorically applied to the actions and consequences of characters in Romeo and Juliet?

Teaching Romeo and Juliet with a focus on character analysis offers a rich opportunity for students to engage with one of the greatest works of English Literature.

By incorporating differentiation strategies, providing clear assessment opportunities, and managing time effectively, educators can ensure a comprehensive and engaging learning experience.
