Detailed Lesson Flow

Introduction to Displacement and Relocation

What is Displacement and Relocation?

Displacement and relocation refer to the forced or voluntary movement of individuals or groups from their homes or communities to another location, often due to conflict, persecution, or natural disasters.

Causes of Displacement and Relocation

- · Conflict and war
- Persecution and human rights violations
- Natural disasters and environmental degradation
- · Economic instability and poverty

Effects of Displacement and Relocation

- Physical and emotional trauma
- Social and cultural disruption
- Economic instability and poverty
- Loss of identity and community



Case Study: The Rohingya Refugee Crisis
