



# Exploring Common Characters, Themes, and Plots in Teen Literature

## Character Analysis

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Read the following passage from *"The Hunger Games"* by Suzanne Collins and answer the questions that follow.

Passage: "I volunteer as tribute."

1. Who is the main character in this passage?
2. What motivates the main character to volunteer as tribute?
3. How does the main character's decision affect the plot of the story?

## Theme Identification

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Read the following passage from *"The Fault in Our Stars"* by John Green and identify the theme.

Passage: "Some infinities are bigger than other infinities."

1. What is the theme of this passage?
2. How does the author use literary devices to convey the theme?
3. What message do you think the author is trying to convey through this theme?

## Plot Structure

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Read the following summary of "The Giver" by Lois Lowry and identify the plot structure.

*Summary: The story takes place in a utopian society where all memories of emotion, love, and pain have been erased. The main character, Jonas, begins to question the society's perfection and eventually discovers the truth about his world.*

1. What is the exposition of the story?
2. What is the rising action of the story?
3. What is the climax of the story?

## Literary Devices

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Read the following passage from *"The Perks of Being a Wallflower"* by Stephen Chbosky and identify the literary devices used.

Passage: *"I was a wallflower, observing life from the sidelines."*

1. What literary device is used in this passage?
2. How does the author use this literary device to convey the theme?
3. What effect does the literary device have on the reader?

## Character Development

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Read the following passage from *"The Maze Runner"* by James Dashner and analyze the character development.

Passage: "I don't know who I am or where I came from."

1. How does the main character change throughout the story?
2. What motivates the main character's actions?
3. How does the author use character development to convey the theme?

## Theme Development

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Read the following passage from *"The Book Thief"* by Markus Zusak and analyze the theme development.

Passage: "Words are powerful, and they can be used to hurt or to heal."

1. What is the theme of this passage?
2. How does the author develop the theme throughout the story?
3. What message do you think the author is trying to convey through this theme?

## Plot Twist

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Read the following passage from *"Divergent"* by Veronica Roth and identify the plot twist.

Passage: *"I'm Divergent."*

1. What is the plot twist in this passage?
2. How does the plot twist affect the plot of the story?
3. What does the plot twist reveal about the main character?

## Creative Writing

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*Write a short story using one of the themes or characters from the passages you have read.*

*Prompt: Write a story about a character who discovers a hidden world within their own world.*
