Integrating the Objective: A Metaphorical Approach

First Law (Inertia):

• Characters' initial states and how they change or resist change throughout the play.

Second Law (Force and Acceleration):

• How external forces (like family feud, love) accelerate characters' actions and decisions.

Third Law (Action and Reaction):

• Every action by a character leads to a reaction, illustrating the play's tragic sequence of events.
