Lesson Objectives

By the end of this lesson, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize and identify the uppercase and lowercase forms of the letter W
- 2. Understand the sound of the letter W and associate it with simple vocabulary words
- 3. Develop phonological awareness and vocabulary building skills
- Demonstrate an understanding of basic language skills, including listening, speaking, reading, and writing

Lesson Introduction (10 minutes)

Introduction to the letter W (2 minutes)

- Show students a picture of a whale or a worm and ask if they know what sound the letter W makes
- · Introduce the letter W using flashcards or posters, demonstrating the uppercase and lowercase forms

Vocabulary building (4 minutes)

- · Use pictures and objects to demonstrate the vocabulary words water, wind, wet, whale, and worm
- · Have students repeat the words and identify the objects

Song and rhyme (4 minutes)

 Sing a simple song or recite a rhyme that incorporates the letter W, such as "The Wheels on the Bus" or "The Worms Go Marching"

Teaching Script (20 minutes)

Introduction to the letter W (5 minutes)

- · Review the letter W and its sound using flashcards and posters

Vocabulary matching (5 minutes)

- Prepare a set of picture cards with the vocabulary words water, wind, wet, whale, and worm
- Have students match the picture cards to the corresponding vocabulary words

W word scavenger hunt (5 minutes)

- Hide objects around the classroom that start with the letter W, such as a water bottle or a worm toy
- · Have students find the objects and identify the vocabulary words

Independent Practice (15 minutes)

W word coloring (5 minutes)

- Provide students with a coloring sheet featuring objects that start with the letter W, such as a whale or a worm
- · Have students color the objects and identify the starting sound

W word writing (5 minutes)

- Provide students with a worksheet and have them write simple words starting with the letter W, such as "wet" or "wind"

W word storytelling (5 minutes)

- Provide students with a prompt, such as "Tell a story about a whale who loves to play in the water"
