What is a Short Story?

Key Elements of a Short Story

- Character: The people or animals that are part of the story
- Setting: The time and place in which the story takes place
- Theme: The underlying message or idea of the story

Types of Short Stories

- Realistic fiction: Stories that are based on real-life events or situations
- Fantasy: Stories that involve magical or supernatural elements
- Science fiction: Stories that involve science or technology
- Mystery: Stories that involve solving a puzzle or crime

Reading Strategies
