



## Introduction to the Past Simple Tense

*What is the past simple tense? How do we use the past simple tense to describe actions that started and finished in the past?*

The past simple tense is a verb tense used to describe actions that started and finished in the past. It is often used to talk about completed actions, such as "I walked to school yesterday" or "She played soccer last weekend".

### Examples

- I walked to school yesterday
- She played soccer last weekend
- They ate breakfast at 7 am
