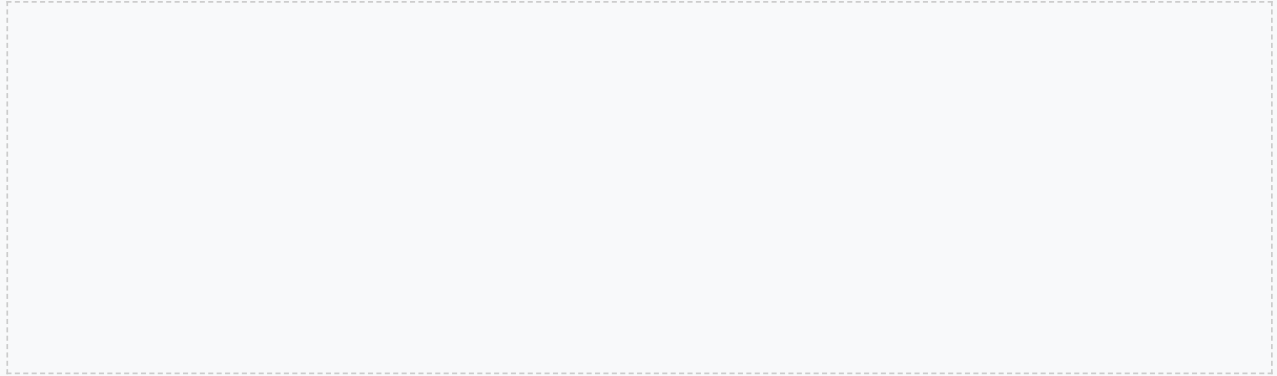
Write a short paragraph using the following prompt:
