Introduction to the Passive Voice

Definition:

The passive voice is a grammatical construction in which the subject of a sentence receives the action described by the verb

Importance:

The passive voice is an essential tool for effective communication in writing, as it allows writers to convey complex ideas with clarity and precision

Examples of Active and Passive Voice

Active Voice:

- The dog bites the man
- The teacher teaches the students

Passive Voice:

- The man is bitten by the dog
- The students are taught by the teacher



Formation of the Passive Voice

Simple Sentences:

- The verb "to be" is used in combination with the past participle of the main verb
- · The subject of the sentence receives the action described by the verb

Present, Past, and Future Tenses:

- The passive voice can be used in all three tenses, with the verb "to be" changing accordingly
- Examples: The ball is thrown (present), The ball was thrown (past), The ball will be thrown (future)
