4. Describe the character's relationship with another character in a given text. How does this relationship affect the plot and the character's development?

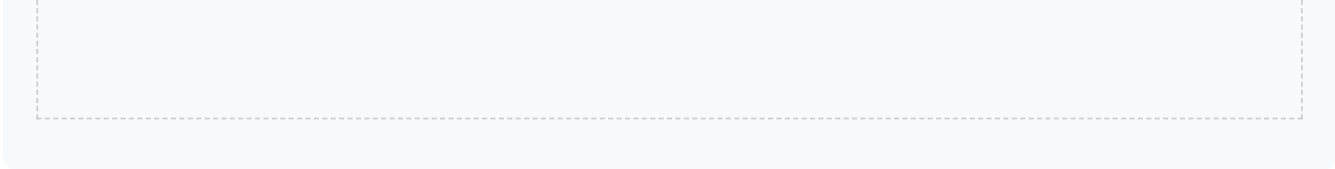
5. Identify and explain the theme of a given text. How does the author develop this theme throughout the story?
