



Introduction

Quiz	Multiple-choice quiz on the main ideas and themes presented in the TED Talk	20%

Time Management Considerations

- **Introduction and context** (10 minutes): Introduction to the topic and context of the TED Talk
- **TED Talk and discussion** (30 minutes): Viewing of the TED Talk and class discussion
- **Multimedia integration and group work** (40 minutes): Students will work in groups to create their own multimedia presentations and participate in small group discussions
- **Assessment and reflection** (20 minutes): Students will complete a reflective essay and participate in a quiz to assess their understanding



Student Engagement Factors

- **Real-world connections:** The concept of home and identity will be connected to real-world issues and experiences, making the topic more relevant and engaging for students
- **Student choice:** Students will have the opportunity to choose their own topics and approaches for their multimedia presentations, allowing them to take ownership of their learning
