Question Mark (?)

Used at the end of a sentence that asks a direct question.

Example: Do you understand punctuation?

More Punctuation Marks

Exclamation Point (!)

Expresses strong emotion or excitement.

Example: What an amazing lesson!

Apostrophe (')

Shows possession or creates contractions.

Examples:

Sarah's book (possession)

Can't = Cannot (contraction)

Quotation Marks (" ")

Enclose exact words spoken by someone or highlight specific terms.

Example: "Punctuation is fun!" said the teacher.

- Punctuation can change the entire meaning of a sentence
- Different punctuation creates different reading experiences
- Careful punctuation helps clear communication
