- Multiple Choice Questions: 1 point for each correct answer
- Short Answer Questions: 6 points for each question (2 points for content knowledge, 2 points for analysis and evaluation, 2 points for clarity and organization)
- Essay Question: 30 points (10 points for content knowledge, 10 points for analysis and evaluation, 5 points for clarity and organization, 5 points for use of evidence and examples)
- Project-Based Question: 20 points (10 points for content knowledge, 5 points for creativity and design, 3 points for clarity and organization, 2 points for use of visual elements)
