Pre-Lesson Preparation

Background Information

Romeo and Juliet, written by William Shakespeare, is a tragic love story about two young lovers from feuding families in Verona.

Learning Objectives

Character Analysis Essay

Character Analysis Rubric

- Style and Conventions (30 points): Is the writing clear, concise, and free of errors?



Theme Discussion

Have students participate in a class discussion on the themes of the play, using textual evidence to support their arguments.

- What are the main themes of the play?
- How do the characters' motivations and conflicts drive the plot of the play?
- What role does fate play in the tragic ending of the play?

Theme Discussion Rubric

- Participation and Engagement (40 points): Does the student actively participate in the discussion and engage with their peers?
- Depth and Insight of Analysis (30 points): Does the student provide thoughtful and insightful analysis of the themes?
- Use of Textual Evidence (30 points): Does the student use textual evidence to support their arguments?
