Lesson Overview

Welcome to this lesson plan on "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry, designed for ESL adult learners aged 18 and older. This lesson aims to improve reading comprehension, vocabulary, and critical thinking skills through the exploration of a classic short story. The story's themes of love, sacrifice, and the true meaning of gift-giving will resonate with adult learners and encourage meaningful discussions and reflections.

Lesson Objectives

Vocabulary List

- Sacrifice: to give up something valuable or important for the sake of something else
- Irony: a contrast between what is expected and what actually happens
- Foreshadowing: a hint or suggestion of what is to come

Literary Devices

The story "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry uses several literary devices, including:

- Symbolism: the hair and the watch are symbols of the sacrifices made by Della and Jim
- Irony: the irony of the situation is that Della and Jim both sacrifice their most precious possessions to buy gifts for each other, only to find that the gifts are now useless
- Foreshadowing: the story hints at the ending when Della and Jim are discussing their plans for Christmas

Extension Activities

- Creative Writing: ask students to write a short story about a time when they made a sacrifice for someone they love
- Debate: have students debate the importance of selfless love and sacrifice in relationships
- Book Club: have students read and discuss other stories or novels that explore similar themes

Assessment Rubric

- Content (40%): does the student demonstrate an understanding of the story's themes and literary devices?
- Organization (30%): is the student's writing well-organized and easy to follow?
- Grammar and Mechanics (20%): does the student demonstrate strong grammar and mechanics skills?
- Vocabulary (10%): does the student use vocabulary from the story effectively?
