Detailed Lesson Flow

Definition:

Transportation modes are ways of moving people or things from one place to another

Why are Transportation Modes Important?

Importance:

Transportation modes are important because they help us get where we need to go and transport goods and services

Impact on Daily Life:

- Helps us get to school or work
- Allows us to travel to different places
- Helps us transport goods and services

Definitions:

- Car: a road vehicle with four wheels
- Bus: a large vehicle that carries many people
- Train: a self-propelled vehicle on rails
- Airplane: a vehicle that flies through the air

- Provide opportunities for children to use sentence frames in context
- Encourage children to create their own sentence frames

Sorting Transportation Modes

Categories:

- Vehicles that drive on roads
- Vehicles that fly
- Vehicles that travel on rails

Example Pictures:

- Car
- Airplane
- Train

Using Visual Aids to Support Sorting

Visual Aids:

- Pictures of transportation modes
- Diagrams of transportation modes

Example Activities:

- Sorting pictures of transportation modes into categories
- Creating a diagram of a transportation mode

Reading a Story about Transportation Modes

Story Title:

The Little Train

Summary:

The story is about a little train that travels from one place to another, carrying people and goods

Using the Story to Teach Transportation Modes

Teaching Points:

- Introduce the concept of trains as a mode of transportation
- Discuss the importance of trains in transporting people and goods

Example Questions:

- What is the little train carrying?
