Short Answer Questions

Declarative Sentence Example and Purpose: A declarative sentence states a fact or opinion (e.g., "The sky is blue.") and is used to provide information.

Interrogative Sentence Example and Characteristics: An interrogative sentence asks a question (e.g., "What is the capital of France?") and typically starts with a question word (who, what, where, etc.).

Imperative Sentence Example and Situation: An imperative sentence gives a command or instruction (e.g., "Turn off the lights.") and is often used in directives or instructions.

Exclamatory Sentence Example and Emotion: An exclamatory sentence expresses strong emotions (e.g., "What a beautiful day!") and usually ends with an exclamation mark.

Implementation Guidelines

Time Allocation: The total time for the assessment is 20 minutes, divided into 5 minutes for multiple choice questions, 8 minutes for short answer questions, and 7 minutes for the interactive quiz.

Feedback opportunities include immediate feedback after the assessment, highlighting areas of strength and weakness, and suggesting further learning activities to reinforce understanding of sentence types.
