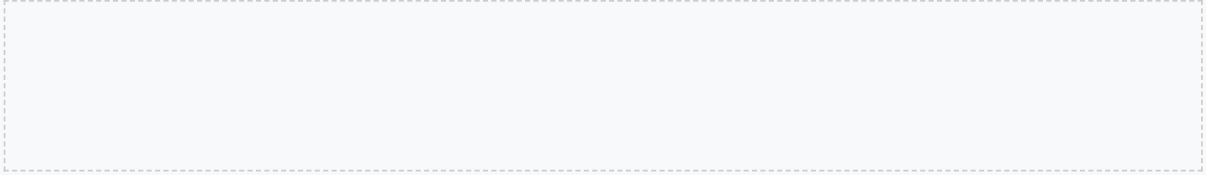

1. How does the story "The Rainbow Serpent" relate to the theme of creation?


2. What is the significance of the Eagle in the story "The Eagle and the Crow"?

3. How does the author use descriptive language in the story "The Seven Sisters"?


Cultural Awareness

Complete the following activities to demonstrate your understanding of First Nations cultures:


1. Draw a picture of a traditional Indigenous ceremony or ritual.
