Introduction to Vocal Music Fundamentals

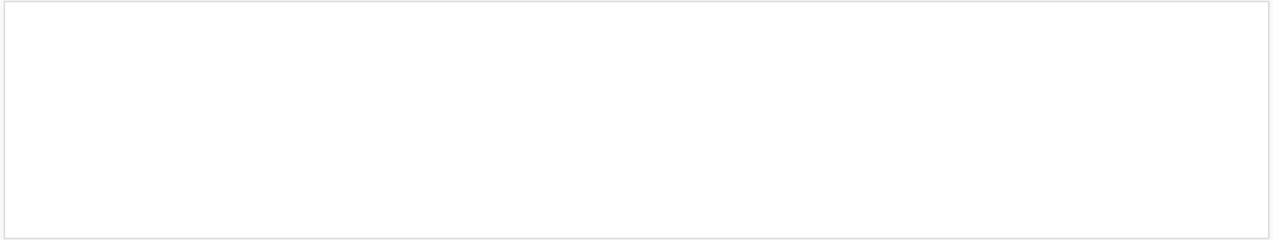
