Forming Comparative Forms

To form the comparative of regular adjectives, we add *-er* to the end of the word.

- big → bigger
- happy → happier
- tall → taller

Some adjectives have irregular comparative forms.

- good → better
- far → farther/further
- little → less

Forming Superlative Forms

To form the superlative of regular adjectives, we add *-est* to the end of the word.

- big → biggest
- happy → happiest
- tall → tallest

- far → farthest/furthest
- little → least
