1. What did you learn about your partner?

2. How did you feel during the interview?

3. What would you like to learn more about your partner?



Activity 5: Group Mural

Divide into small groups and create a mural that represents your group's personality, interests, or goals.

1. What did you contribute to the mural?

2. How did you work together as a team?

3. What does the mural represent about your group?

Conclusion and Reflection

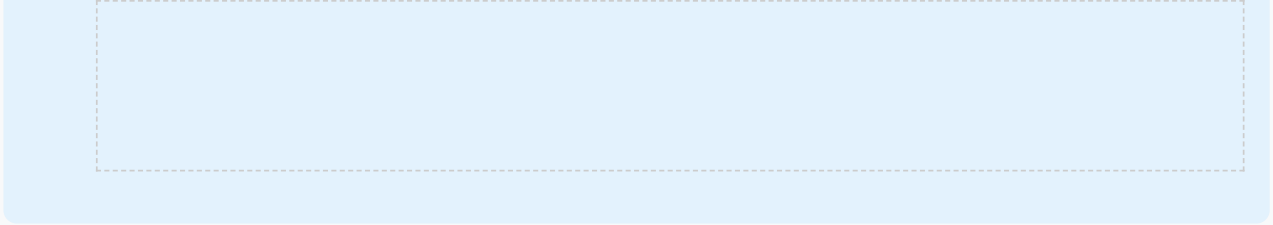

1. What did you learn about yourself and your peers during the activities?


2. How did you feel during the activities?
