Introduction to Basic Sentence Structure

Welcome to this homework assignment on basic sentence structure! In this worksheet, you will learn about the concepts of subjects and predicates, and how to use them to construct simple sentences.

A subject is the person, place, or thing that is performing the action in a sentence. A predicate is the action that the subject is performing. For example: "The dog runs quickly." In this sentence, "The dog" is the subject and "runs quickly" is the predicate.
