Pre-Lesson Preparation

Vocabulary Practice

Vocabulary Games

- Matching game: Match the vocabulary with the correct definition
- · Charades: Act out the vocabulary without speaking
- Scavenger hunt: Find objects in the classroom that match the vocabulary



Role-Play Activity

Students will participate in a role-play activity to practice using greetings and introductions in context Students will take turns introducing themselves and asking each other questions

Group Discussions
